


ACTS OF THE APOSTLE 10:25-26, 34-25, 44-48

The gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out upon the Gentiles also.

When Peter entered, Cornelius met him and, falling at his feet, paid him homage. Peter, however, raised him up, saying, "Get up. I myself am also a human being." Then Peter proceeded to speak and said, "In truth, I see that God shows no partiality. Rather, in every nation whoever fears him and acts uprightly is acceptable to him." While Peter was still speaking these things, the Holy Spirit fell upon all who were listening to the word. 



THE FIRST NOVENA

Forty days after the Resurrection, Jesus ascends into heaven... so that His humanity might be fully glorified, so that He might send us the Holy Spirit, and so that He might become our High Priest who constantly guides and sanctifies us as we pilgrimage through life to where He is now. How do we know that it was for forty days that Jesus appeared to His apostles as risen? Because Luke tells us: "To them (the disciples) he (Jesus) presented himself alive after his passion by many proofs, appearing to them during forty days, and speaking of the kingdom of God" (Acts 1:3).

Ten days later, and thus fifty days after the Resurrection, on the Jewish Feast of Pentecost (which feast celebrated the giving of the Law, the Torah, in the desert), our exalted Lord—along with His Father—sends the Holy Spirit upon the Church. The nine days in between the Ascension and Pentecost are a time of mixed emotion for the disciples... of fear over facing opposition and rejection, of joy because of the Resurrection, and of expectant prayer because Christ told them to wait in the city until they receive the "promise of my Father" and are "clothed with power from on high" (Lk 24:49), referring to the Holy Spirit. This prayerful time of nine days is what we call the "first novena" (novena meaning "nine"). Later on in the life of the Church, a tradition developed in which believers—with this event in mind—would pray for nine days for a special intention, hoping at the end to obtain some special spiritual gift.

In the Easter season, we relive all these events. Naturally, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Ascension forty days after Easter, which is this Thursday, Ascension Thursday. Ten days later, we celebrate the Solemnity of Pentecost, on Pentecost Sunday. It is fitting that we ourselves, like the first disciples, also dedicate ourselves to prayer during the in-between days, beginning the day after the Ascension. One way to do this is to pray a Novena to the Holy Spirit during those days. These nine days is an opportune time for us each year to grow in our love of, and devotion and docility to, the Holy Spirit, and to pray for a deepening of His presence and power at work in our lives. There are various novenas with different prayers that make this their aim. My favorite is a traditional novena made available on the EWTN website, which we have reproduced in a booklet, copies of which we will make available to you at the entrance of the Church this Sunday. Blessed Ascension and Pentecost! Blessed days of the first novena as well!

Defiant Requiem is a feature-length documentary film that tells the extraordinary, untold story of the brave acts of resistance by Jewish prisoners at Theresienstadt (Terezín) during World War II.

The film highlights a dramatic example of intellectual and artistic courage: the remarkable story of Rafael Schächter, a brilliant young Czech conductor who demonstrated moral leadership under brutal circumstances by sustaining hope and courage for his fellow prisoners by creating a prisoner choir and "singing to the Nazis what they dared not say." This is a film about how a rare form of courage sparked compelling determination to survive by answering the worst of mankind with the best of mankind.

Defiant Requiem was nominated for two Documentary Emmy Awards in 2014 for best writing and best feature length documentary. The film is the recipient of numerous awards and has been broadcast on PBS, BBC4, French TV and Globostat in Brazil.


